

This month Kathy continues her interview with Barbara Ruediger.

"After 34 years I am still surprised at how much fun it has been." Barbara Ruediger was a volunteer in her son's third grade when the class visited SBMA in 1980. Intrigued by the docent tour and the training program, she joined the provisional class of 1981 and has never looked back.

Barbara assumed a position as student team leader in her second year and with the exception of one year as a Provisional Instructor, has been a student team leader for 33 years. "We toured classes from 11-noon and 1-2 with an hour break for lunch. A

member of the touring team would visit the classroom with a slide presentation prior to the scheduled visit. Before the renovation in 1982, all visitors entered through the State Street doors."

The position of Membership Chair was developed in 1990 when the Program began to award service pins. Barbara served in that position for 4 years, was Treasurer for 1 year, head of Student Teams for 5 years, and served as Chair of Classroom Slide Talks when that was a Board position.

"The Siqueros Mural arrived in 2001, creating a lot of attention and a new challenge to student touring". There have been many challenges over the years. "During a Rodin exhibit a teacher of a 5<sup>th</sup> grade class called, requesting that his students not tour the exhibit due to the nudity. Impressed by his own visit to the exhibit, he called again saying he had changed his mind".

After 20 years Barbara stopped touring adults to concentrate on student touring. "With adults you don't get the same type of creative spontaneous response as you do with students".

Barbara carefully prepares for each student tour, using visual aids she has collected over the years. She coordinates team members with quiet grace. "I have noticed a big increase in the number of parent volunteers, especially fathers coming to SBMA with their children".

This week after her final tour, her team will take her out for a celebration lunch. When she was asked recently what has surprised her most about being a docent at SBMA she replied, "After 34 years, I am still surprised at how much fun it has been".

Docent tours in all categories continue to enjoy excellent attendance. The *Botticelli* team added an extra 2 o'clock tour on Sunday afternoons. *Ten Talks* had extra tours on the First Thursday night in March with over 100 visitors in the museum at any given time. Several 100-plus groups of high school students were toured.

March tour numbers were even better than February. Docents toured 1167 visitors on 78 tours for an average of 15 per tour. The total was comprised of 65 regular tours and 13 Special Request s for *Botticelli*. April is likely to have similarly fabulous numbers. *Botticelli* alone will approximate 400 visitors on regular tours and 550 on Special Requests.

Docents continue helping visitors connect with art, fulfilling the SBMA mission. Congratulations to all of us.



# The Community Speakers Program: An Update

Shirley and I are delighted to report the Community Speaker's Program (CSP) is off and running! On March 30th I made a presentation to the Board of Trustees. They were very enthusiastic, understanding the program's potential for increasing awareness of the Museum through art education.

In addition to presentations in the community, we are featuring the CSP on the Museum website and blog, sending out press releases—one of which resulted in a feature article in Noozhawk—and sending email advertisements.

These strategies have yielded positive results. Shirley has already given four *Botticelli*, *Titian & Beyond* presentations (photo below) to organizations, including The Little Town Club, the Santa Barbara Library, The Californian, and Heritage House. I have given two *European Artistic Revolution: 70 Amazing Years* presentations, one at The Californian and one at the UCSB Student Museum Association. I'm scheduled for five more: Alexander Gardens, Solvang Library, Institute of World Culture, Goleta Library, and the Yacht Club.

Two groups have scheduled follow-up docent tours, which is the goal of speaking to these organizations –

bringing people to the Museum where they can experience the art in person.

We are thrilled the CPS is being received with such Enthusiasm! Requests for presentations are a sure sign the program is taking off. Shirley and I are working hard, adding new themes to our list of offerings. If you are a part of an organization or know of one that would enjoy a presentation, let me know.

From our Provisional Co-Chair

In discussions with the Education Department, officers and board of the Docent Council, all are agreed that we will have a provisional class beginning this fall for the 2015-2016 year.

Due to the fluid state of the galleries and specific artworks during ongoing renovation, the provisional class syllabus will be adapted to make use of available works as we exercise the notable flexibility we have each adopted as a way of docent life.

Much of the course content will remain the same, but some *major changes* to the organization and assignments are being introduced, as follows:

Conduct the class on Wednesday instead of Thursday Council meeting lectures are more relevant to touring than Thursday Art Talks Class will attend lecture only, not business segment of meeting Focus each term on specific aspect of the docent role Fall term: Fundamentals of Art and the Art of Touring Students Winter term: The Art of Touring Adults Spring term: The Art of the Highlights Tour Re-introduce the requirement to observe a classroom PowerPoint presentation Require three student touring evaluations, ideally each a different grade level Fall term: Present one piece on a student tour Winter term: Present two pieces with transition on a student tour Spring term: Conduct a complete student tour Introduce a lecture/discussion of safety rules with Security personnel Please direct any questions to Mary Ellen or Ralph. Throughout the coming year we ask your cooperation and understanding for what will certainly be a challenging but exhilarating year for the Docent Council.


## The Artist Project, A Clip

Mr. Tomkins is a long time writer for *The New Yorker* magazine. The biography was originally published in 1996, then updated and reissued by MoMA in 2014 in celebration of the 100th anniversary of Duchamp's first readymade, "Bicycle Wheel." It's a very readable account of an enormously influential artist and a fascinating and very charming man.



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## Get a Jump on Your Summer Reading with Reif Larson By Ricki Morse



I haven't been this excited about a writer since I opened Haruki Murakami's *The Wind-Up Bird Chronicle* in 2010.

According to Reif Larson, Gabriel Garcia Marquez is a major influence, which is abundantly apparent from the opening scene of *I Am Radar*, his just-published second novel. I wish I could offer a review, but I am on page 112 of the 648 page tome, and don't have the time or the requisite beach for an extended power read.

Larsen was born in 1980 in Boston, educated at good schools, parented by artists, and is currently a writer in residence at The

University of St. Andrew's in Scotland. His first novel, unlike every other first novel I know of, drew a lively competition among publishers, ultimately earning Larsen a million dollar advance for *The Selected Works of T. S. Spivet* in 2008.

He illustrates his books with marginalia—jotting, drawings, maps, documents—and describes his work as "non-linear reading." He employs this talent for informed doodling on his personal web site at <u>http://www.reiflarsen.com</u>, a quirky, engaging introduction to his surprising mind.

His writing in *Radar* may be "non-linear", but Larson leads us to a profound question: How do we come to know our children?
