- 10. Can you see texture? Is it smooth? Shiny? Dull?
- 11. What shapes do you see?
- 12. How are the shapes arranged?
- 13. What music would you play to describe the painting?
- 14. What does the painting inspire you to write?
- 15. If you were in this painting, how would you feel?
- 16. Does the artist show his or her personality in the work?
